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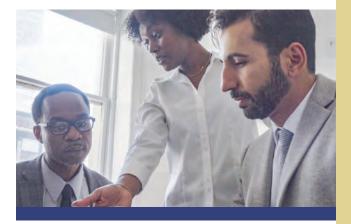

Dr. Fehlhaber received her PhD in Neuroscience from UCLA in 2017, where she studied the molecular mechanisms of the first synapse of sight and founded Knowing Neurons, a creative education website dedicated to making neuroscience more accessible to the general public. It won the 2016 Next Generation Award from the Society for Neuroscience, has been featured in Forbes magazine, and is currently listed as #3 on Feedspot's Top 90 Neuroscience Blogs.

Dr. Fehlhaber was selected as a 2020 OWL Fellow and is currently serving on the Membership Impact Committee. She spearheaded the 2019 OWL Survey and hosted a webinar to examine the results. At TFG, she is leading a commitment to diversity and inclusion in ophthalmic education. Her nominator calls her "brilliant and hard-working" and suggests she is "one to watch" in ophthalmology.

Mr. Maller has received multiple awards in the healthcare market, and has also taken key leadership positions in employee resource groups within Alcon. Having grown up and worked in different countries with different cultures, and not fitting many stereotypes, advancing diversity is an important value for Mr. Maller.

ALANNA NATTIS is a cornea, cataract and refractive surgeon, as well as the Director of Clinical Research at SightMD, and an associate professor in ophthalmology and surgery at NYIT-College of Osteopathic Medicine. During residency and her fellowship with world-renowned eye surgeons Eric Donnenfeld and Henry Perry, Dr. Nattis published over 15 articles in peer-reviewed journals, wrote 2 textbook chapters, and has co-authored a landmark ophthalmology textbook designed to help guide and teach surgical techniques to residents and fellows - with the second edition coming out in 2021.

Her nominator says: "As a strong, smart female in ophthalmology, Dr. Nattis has pioneered the way to show us what 'good' looks like. Not only has she spent the last few years rising in the ranks and becoming a national name, but she has done so while mentoring and educating those around her. She has been involved in several research projects, including industry-sponsored studies and investigator-initiated trials, and has stepped ahead of her timetables to show that she is a capable leader. Have you ever seen someone who is still rising ensure that they lift up those around them? Alanna is that person!"



Eyes on Inclusion

Four LGBTQ+ members of the eyecare community discuss what it means to be Out in Eyecare.

On June 18th, 2021, OWL & Alcon hosted the 'Eyes on Inclusion' webinar, wherein four panelists discussed what it means to be Out in Eyecare:

What makes you proud to be part of the LGBTQ+ community?

Peter MacIntosh, MD: I'm proud to be part of this time in history, where there's so much support and understanding for the community, and where coming out is becoming an easier process.

Amanda Lee, OD: I admire how far we've progressed since I came out, and all the people brave enough to be out before our time.



Eyes on Inclusion

Scott Walter, MD, MSc.: I'm proud of my husband and the life we've built together, and that I have this chance to be my genuine self in a visible, public platform like ophthalmology.

Heather Attra: I'm proud of the perseverance and sacrifice of those who have fought and still fight for our rights. LGBTQ+ people are a part of every culture, every race and every society; because of that, we are accepted today more than ever. We still have a long way to go to eliminate the prejudice and discrimination that persists, however, we have seen great progress.

Are you out at work? What prompted you to come out?

Attra: I came out recently. In 2020, we started a campaign to ramp up our efforts around D&I here at Alcon, and it felt disingenuous to ask others what they would commit to do to drive inclusion if I was too afraid to be my full authentic self at work. Now that I am out, I only wish I had been brave enough to do it sooner.

Has being your authentic self affected your interactions with your patients?

Walter: It's not always immediately relevant, but it can be valuable. You encounter older patients who are themselves in the closet and you might be the first doctor they had who identified as LGBTQ+.

MacIntosh: It allows you to build much deeper relationships with patients, colleagues, and friends. You find new topics to connect with people over.

Lee: I advise anyone listening to be their authentic self. It shows your patients that you're real, and it takes the weight off you.

How much of your personal life do you choose to keep private and why?

MacIntosh: I don't keep anything decidedly private. I think as a program director, it's important to be open to make trainees feel comfortable.

Attra: I only came out at work a year ago and I now choose to be fully open about my personal life. I am still working on breaking old habits like using ambiguous wording or not talking about my wife. Protecting myself has been so ingrained, for so long, it will take a little time. So many people have been so supportive, and I find being open has allowed me to truly connect in more meaningful ways with my coworkers and associates.

Any examples where you helped change someone's view?

Lee: I had a patient who admitted to being suicidal, and in the same breath said he thought he might be gay. I stopped the exam, and told him that I was gay, and that I was there for him. I grew from that experience, and when I last saw him, he was in a healthy relationship with his partner and planning to be married. Being open and not afraid to be who you are can be profound in many ways.

What causes a fear of coming out?

Walter: We're afraid because we're uncertain how others will respond. Unlike other minorities, members of the LGBTQ+ community have agency as to when to come out, which creates anxiety about when to come out, and how it will go. The fear of coming out is valid, but probably exaggerated in most cases; the more you do it, the easier it gets.

Do you feel like there have been any negative repercussions from

coming out?

MacIntosh: I had a very religious friend who initially said he didn't agree with it, but he didn't cut me out of his life over it, and a couple of years later he said he had reconsidered that statement and apologized.

Attra: When I first came out to my parents, it went badly. Having the people who are supposed to love you unconditionally embarrassed by who you are leaves a lingering impact. The good news is we now have a healthy and supportive relationship, so it's important to leave the door open for people to grow.

Do you think it has been important for your job defining yourself openly as a LGBTQ+ person?

Attra: Before I came out, I would have said no; but now that I am open, I know it is very important. I am so much more fulfilled being open. I was compartmentalizing and sacrificing a part of myself and it was taking a toll on me and my relationships at work. I now realize I deserve to get to be my authentic self and I won't go back in the closet. I have also gotten quite a few notes from others letting me know how important it was for them to see the support I have received and has given them the courage to be themselves.

What advice would you give to allies for helping diversity and inclusion?

Walter: Don't be afraid to broaden your circles and include those different from you. Ophthalmology is more diverse than it used to be and there are lots of opportunities to align yourself with your colleagues. You may be surprised by how much you have in common with people you initially perceived as "different."

MacIntosh: Allies should just get to know us. They should lose their preconceived notions of what it is to be LGBTQ+ and learn what it actually is by talking to their colleagues.

Lee: It's critical to create a safe space for people who want to come out. The more diverse our entities become, the stronger they become. So you'll find that it enriches your community and work culture.

Is there one thing that your organization has done to make you feel more comfortable being your authentic self at work?

Attra: As I mentioned earlier, last year we accelerated our conversations at Alcon surrounding diversity and inclusion. These discussions let me see that I had quite a few allies among the leadership. There has been an increase in visible acts of support, whether it's raising the Pride Flag on campus, or the activities surrounding Pride Month, and that's important in showing we have an environment where people are safe to be who they are.

Any advice for LGBTQ+ people just entering your field?

Attra: I'd recommend you do your research into the company's policies, values, and behaviors. Make sure you find a place that you feel is going to be welcoming, so you don't feel the need to hide a part of who you are.

MacIntosh: Being out at work is a personal decision. You shouldn't feel pressure to say anything about your personal life if you don't want to. While there are many laws to protect us, once you are out things may change in terms of your professional relationships, for the better or for the worse.

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
